

# Country's first school of hospitality to come up in Gurgaon's Sec 83

**GURGAON:** The Indian School of Hospitality (ISH), a hospitality education venture which has conceived India's first Indian School of Hospitality in Sector 83, has tied up with a local developer for setting up the facility. The facility will be operational by August next year.

Dilip Puri, founder and chief executive officer of ISH, announced on Tuesday that it has tied up with Vatika hospitality to develop India's first Indian School of Hospitality. Currently under construction, the campus is located at the commercial complex of Vatika India Next in Sector 83.

ISH has entered into a strategic partnership with Lausanne Hospitality Consulting for curriculum development and faculty training, said Puri.

He informed that in addition to a four-year hospitality management programme, the school will offer several long and short-term programmes in both culinary specialisations as well as a whole range of executive education programmes catering to professionals in hospitality, travel, aviation, retail and other customer-focused industries.
